# **Mississippi Crop Progress and Condition Report**

The National Agricultural Statistics Service in cooperation with the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce produces a weekly Crop Progress and Condition Report for Mississippi.

Of interest to cattle producers, the report indicates the percentages of livestock, hay, and pasture categorized as Excellent, Good, Fair, Poor, or Very Poor. The report also notes the percent of warm-season hay harvested and compares it to the same time last year and over the average of the last 5 years.

Mississippi State University Extension Service agents provide county-level observations in a comments section of the report. The report also contains a weekly Mississippi Weather Summary including air temperature and precipitation statistics for 39 automated weather stations at locations throughout the state.

## **U.S. Beef Cattle Breed Registrations Update**

The National Pedigreed Livestock Council lists registration data from their member organizations on its website: www.nplc.net/membership.html

The most recent data posted reflects 2011 beef cattle registrations. With the exception of the American Brahman Breeders Association, the registration totals from the other member breed associations all decreased from 2007 to 2011.

This general trend for fewer purebred cattle registrations coincides with a decrease in the nation's cattle inventory over the same period. According to USDA, there were 96.0 million head of cattle in the U.S. as of January 1, 2008. By January 1, 2012, this number had dropped to 90.8 million head.
